BOT Election

The Esplanade Condominium Trust **Annual Meeting of the Association of Unit Owners** will take place virtually via Zoom on Tuesday, November 17, 2020, at 7 pm.

All Unit Owners, whether resident or non-resident, have received from the Management Office a package of materials for the Annual Meeting, and we have received two notices via email encouraging our participation and attendance.

A quorum of 40% of the Beneficial Interests of the Esplanade is required for the Annual Meeting and voting (the Beneficial Interest of your individual unit can be found in your original condominium documents). The 40% quorum may be obtained by any combination of proxies, ballots, or personal attendance at the Annual Meeting.

Included in the package (p. 2) is a ballot to elect four Trustees for a three-year term on the Board of Trustees.

There are five candidates for the four open positions on the Board of Trustees: Mary Jo Bane, Jane Blalock (candidate for re-election), Fred Davis (re-election), Anne Johnston, and John T. Yee (re-election). Also included in the package are materials submitted by each of the five candidates asking for your vote and stating their reasons for wanting to serve and represent you in all matters coming before the Board. There will be no open positions for election or re-election for two more years.

As a Unit Owner, you have the choice between two different ways of casting your vote for the Board of Trustees:

EITHER:

1) Use the individual ballot (p. 2 of package) to vote for up to four candidates. You may vote for one, two, three, or four, as you see fit. As instructed in the Annual Meeting notice, please sign the ballot and return to the Management Office either in person or by mail.

OR:

2) Use the proxy (p. 3 of package) to appoint a proxy (and an alternative) to act on your behalf for **all** matters that come up in the Annual Meeting, not only for the election of Trustees but for all matters that are brought to a vote in the meeting. As instructed in the Annual Meeting notice, please sign the proxy and return to the Management Office in person or by mail.

We encourage everyone to read the materials on the upcoming Annual Meeting and to vote in the election for the Board of Trustees however you choose to do so.

Meet Your Esplanade Neighbors





recently awarded the International Wolf Prize 'for a career motivated by the social concerns of architecture'). <u>**Read more**</u>



American Dialogue: The





Eats

In this issue we're introducing a new column: EATS – a Repository for Revered Recipes. We invite you to contribute your treasured recipes to warm our hearts (and stomachs) as we cook our way through these ridiculous times. Our first contribution is from Susan Barron who brings us a family favorite.

Barron Brownies



1 stick of butter, 1 cup sugar, 2 squares Baker's unsweetened chocolate, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon vanilla, pinch of salt. 2/3 cup of flour, ½ cup chocolate chips 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees.

2. Grease an 8" by 8" pan (11" by 13" if doubling recipe).

3. Melt chocolate and butter in a double boiler, a single pan on low heat, or in the microwave. If using the microwave, first melt the chocolate for one minute. Add the butter, cut into pieces, and continue microwaving until both butter and chocolate are melted (approximately one more minute).

4. Beat eggs and sugar until light and fluffy with an electric mixer for about 3 to 5 minutes. The eggs and sugar MUST BE LIGHT AND FLUFFY!

5. Mix in the slightly cooled chocolate and butter. Beat until blended well.

6. Mix in the vanilla. Beat to blend.

7. Stir in the flour and salt. Mix only until blended together. Do not overmix at this point.

8. Add chocolate chips. Mix them in to the batter.

9. Put batter in greased pan. Bake <u>18 minutes</u> (cookie tester or toothpick should just come out clean - if a bit of batter remains, this is not a tragedy). The main thing is that you do NOT want the batter to be overcooked.

10. *Put the pan directly into the refrigerator to cool. Yup, this Is the secret !!!!!*

ENJOY!

NOTE: The above recipe may be doubled and baked in an 11" by 13" pan.The only ingredient I do not double is the vanilla.You could add a little more than one teaspoon if you like.That part is up to you.
